
Black History Month Reading List


Black History Month runs from February 1st to March 1st. The theme for 2021 is The Black Family: Representation, Identity, and Diversity. Check out these educational books about Black History!


The Warmth Of Other Suns by Isabel Wilkerson


Hidden Figures by Margot Lee Shetterly

Barracoon: The Story Of The Last "Black Cargo" by Zora Neale Hurston

In 1927, Zora Neale Hurston went to Plateau, Alabama, just outside Mobile, to interview eighty-six-year-old Cudjo Lewis. Of the millions of men, women, and children transported from Africa to America as slaves, Cudjo was then the only person alive to tell the story of this integral part of the nation's history.

A descendant of a slave named Coreen, and-according to oral tradition-her owner, President James Madison, finally shares her family's story.




<u>Black Against Empire: The History And Politics Of The Black Panther</u> <u>Party by Joshua Bloom</u>


The African American Experience: Black History And Culture Through Speeches, Letters, Editorials, Poems, Songs, and Stories by Kai Wright

<u>Defining Moments In Black History: Reading Between The Lies</u> by Dick Gregory



The Black West: A Documentary And Pictorial History Of The African American Role In the Westward Expansion Of The United States by William Loren Katz




Martin's Big Words by Doreen Rappaport

Featuring forty trailblazing black women in American history, *Little Leaders* educates and inspires as it relates true stories of breaking boundaries and achieving beyond expectations.




The ABCs Of Black History by Rio Cortez

Celebrates the 1936 debut of the Benny Goodman quartet with Teddy Wilson in Chicago, considered to be the first widely seen integrated jazz performance.




<u>Timelines From Black History: Leaders, Legends, Legacies</u> by DK Publishing


Brave, Black, First: 50+ African American Women Who Changed The World by Cheryl Willis Hudson
